Overview

- The Community Police Review Board (CPRB) is the **only** agency in the City of Albany responsible for holding the Albany Police Department (APD) accountable to its own policies and applicable laws.
- The City's annual proposed budget is required by Local Law J (§ 42-334(F)) to fund the CPRB in an amount equivalent to no less than 1% of the total proposed budget for APD.
- The CPRB proposes that the FY2025 City Budget dedicates \$804,000 to the CPRB, with no change from FY2024. This amount is equivalent to 1.16% of the Proposed Budget for APD for 2025.
- The Mayor's FY2025 Proposed Budget appropriates \$683,010 to the CPRB, a decrease of 15% from FY2024, and an amount equivalent to 0.99% of the Proposed Budget for APD for 2025.
- The CPRB's Proposed Budget will enable the Board to dedicate sufficient personnel to **fulfill its voter-approved mandate to conduct objective and thorough investigations in a timely manner.**




Personnel



- Due to funding limitations, the CPRB has operated with 1 full-time staff position for **nearly 25 years**. As the CPRB's responsibilities have expanded, the CPRB needs more personnel, including staff investigators, a confidential secretary, and community outreach staff.
- The CPRB's FY2025 Proposed Budget appropriates 4 full-time staff positions and 1 part-time staff position to the CPRB. This proposal creates meaningful jobs for City residents.



Complaints and Investigations

Alleged Police Misconduct Complaints Received Per Year



- From 2018 to 2020, the CPRB received the fewest complaints in its history. The CPRB's outreach efforts and investigations have improved community trust, leading to an increase in complaints received. In 2023, the CPRB received 1.5 times more complaints than in 2022.
- In 2021, Local Law J (Prop 7) was **unanimously passed** by the Common Council. The ballot referendum was **approved by 70% of voters**. Enacted in 2022, Local Law J affirms the CPRB's authority to conduct independent investigations with subpoena power.
- The CPRB has received **49 new complaints** since January 1, 2024. The CPRB has reviewed and provided disciplinary recommendations for **32 complaints** in 2024.
- This year, the CPRB voted to independently investigate **1 incident** of great public interest. The CPRB is currently conducting independent investigations into **5** complaints.
